I write this message at the end of 2014 and reflect on the past year and especially our December meeting, it was a great way to end the year with good

friends, good food and good news. Let me begin with what I call the "dazzling dozen plus two". These were the events that recognized our members. Starting with our members; Steve Abel was inducted into the Arizona Veterans Hall of Fame. Only the most worthy can claim that honor. When Steve's term expired at the Council of Chapters, it was necessary to replace him with three people. This does not count the outstanding work he does for our chapter.

At the December meeting it was an honor to present the 'Chapter Person of the Year' award to Betty Atwater. The award recognized her dedication to chapter activities, serving both as an officer of the chapter and a dedicated and tireless worker in making the baby shower a success.

Special recognition was afforded to Barbara Brown for her eleven year history of outstanding service as Auxiliary Liaison. Barbara has done an excellent job in that post and she will continue serving on the board to provide her expertise to our newest Auxiliary Liaison board member.

Recognize those who have stepped up to serve on the Board of Directors for another year and the two newest members of the board; LTC Thelma Hendricks USA Ret as Auxiliary Liaison. And Joe Longo, former 1LT USA who will serve as Board Secretary. Welcome aboard and thank you for stepping forward. [And now for a brief commercial message]. We still have several slots to fill, namely a public relations person and an assistant Personal Affairs Officer. Let's face it, Steve Abel is carrying several big jobs at both the chapter and council level. Plus we could also use a JROTC Coordinator.

Turning next to one of the most widely recognized activities of the chapter was the highly successful Baby Shower held in March. It was so successful that Barbara Gavre, representing the 162nd Fighter Wing presented the Auxiliary with an award of recognition. In addition, the chapter was presented an award for its overall support of the 162nd. On the funding front, the chapter was awarded a \$5,000 grant from the Armed Services Mutual Benefit Society STAR Foundation. The first allocation went to support the "Turkeys for Troops" effort. Successful? Just ask the thirty families of the 162nd who were recipients of the turkeys and commissary gift cards.

A portion of the ASMBA grant went to the three JROTC units in our area with awards of \$500 to each unit. In the area of JROTC scholarships, it appears the Chapter will be offering three scholarships in 2015. All three may be funded by private sources.

A portion of the grant will fund a substantial contribution to the 162nd non-perishable food pantry. That presentation will take place in January. Recognize the contribution of the "Knitwits" as they turn out lap blankets, baby blankets for the VA Hospital and scarves for Operation Gratitude. None of these activities can be done without the dedicated efforts of our members.

Then there is the Chapter itself. All one has to do is look at the chapter flag and count the eight five star banners adorning the flag. The five star banners symbolize the highest Level of Excellence award conveyed by MOAA. Let me also comment that all nine chapters plus the Council of Chapters in Arizona received five star awards for the second consecutive year. No other state can match that record.

GET TO KNOW YOUR MEMBERS

The quotation, "man's frustrations become his aspirations" could be a descriptive rationale for the "programming" of my life as a young adult. I was born (1939) and raised in rural northeast Louisiana near the village of Crowville, the middle daughter of sharecroppers. We raised cotton. My dad was always looking for a more productive piece of farmland, so we moved a lot. Over the years we lived in six different "tenant" houses, none with indoor plumbing.

Both of my parents had a very strong work ethic. Dad's words, "if you are going to do something, do it right or not at all". He, with the help of his little "hoe hands" i.e. daughters, always had the cleanest cotton field in the parish, not a weed anywhere. My mother functioned like a well-oiled machine. She never stopped. In addition to working in the fields, she always had three delicious "square" meals on the table every day. She was the best gardener in the parish, canning food all summer for winter meals.

It was my mother who taught me to dream---"where there is a will, there is a way"---"you can do anything

During the internship, I developed

an interest in nutrition research and knew that I would need a M.S. in Nutrition to pursue that goal. I found an outstanding program offered by the US Army. I would be able to complete my degree at the school of my choice and receive a salary while in school. Upon completion of the degree, I would report to active duty. Sounded like a good idea to me! I was commissioned into the Army Medical Specialist Corps in 1963 and went directly to graduate school. After receiving my M.S. in Human Nutrition from Virginia Tech, I was assigned as Research Dietitian, Metabolic Division, Walter Reed Army Institute of Research. My next assignment (1965-67) was Chief, Research Dietitian at the US Army Medical Research and Nutrition Laboratory in Denver-- (Nut Lab for short). It comes as a surprise to most people when they learn that the US Army was very instrumental in establishing the "Recommended Dietary Allowances"—(% of daily value on your food labels). These studies were done during the time of the draft when conscientious objectors came on "duty" as "human guinea pigs" for research purposes. I cannot go into great detail here about the difficulties of doing such studies—only to say that they were very tedious and sometimes downright grueling for the research subjects. But I never once heard a complaint. I developed great respect for these young men. I still believe the contributions they made to medical and nutrition research is an "untold story". With the end of the draft, the supply of "guinea pigs" vanished and the NUT Lab eventually closed. Continued on page 5

GET TO KNOW YOUR MEMBERS

Following assignments at Tripler Army Medical Center in Honolulu and Letterman Hospital in San Francisco, I went back to graduate school for a Ph.D. in Human Nutrition at Virginia Tech. After receiving my degree in 1975 I spent the remainder of my career in the Washington D.C. area. I taught nutrition to nursing students at the Walter Reed Army Institute of Nursing. The program closed in 1978. I was a faculty member of the 1976 Charter class of the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences in Bethesda, Maryland and remained on staff until my retirement in 1983. This university provides such a wonderful opportunity for a young person with limited funds to obtain a M.D. degree. Not only do the students receive a free education, they receive a salary while in school. I also served as Clinical Dietetics Consultant to the Office of the Surgeon General from 1975-1983. In addition to writing manuals, I was responsible for providing educational programs for active duty and reserve components for the Medical Department.

About the time that I had 18 years in the military, I met a "real smooth talker" from Oklahoma, Larry Hendricks. Larry was a parasitologist, Army Medical Corps officer, assigned to the Dept. of Experimental Therapeutics at the Walter Reed Army Institute of Research (WRAIR). He, too, had received his Ph.D. while on active duty. We were married in 1981. For his final assignment, Larry was assigned to the WRAIR Research Unit in Nairobi, Kenya in January 1983. I retired in August of that year and joined him in Kenya.

Following Larry's retirement in 1986, we relocated to Missoula, Montana, to build our "dream" log home overlooking the Clark Fork River. I taught nutrition for a year at the University of Montana to make money to buy a fishing boat. Larry recruited me for his full-time hunting and fishing partner. I kept my friends and relatives hilariously entertained or totally amazed with tales of our adventures. A few weeks prior to our tenth wedding anniversary, Larry had a sudden and severe abdominal episode. We thought he had appendicitis. The news from the doctor was not good. Larry was diagnosed with "end stage" colon cancer. He died about 2 years later at age 54.

Following Larry's death I stayed in Montana for another seven years, working at a number of teaching and consulting jobs. One winter day after my second severe fall on the ice, I had a strong desire to move to a place where I could "die with the sun in my face". So I sold out and moved to Green Valley. Shortly after arriving in Green Valley, I met Ken Robinson, a retired mechanical engineer from Denver. He lives around the corner from me---Ken is my best friend and soul mate. I continue with my avid gardening and have added abstract art to my agenda. Since retirement, I sure miss having "days off"!

During my career, I received numerous professional and academic commendations and awards. The two that mean the most to me, professionally, are the "A"prefix (highest proficiency designator awarded in the Armed Forces) and the Legion of Merit. But the most treasured "recognition" award came in my college years while I was sitting in a bus station in a little town near where my mother had grown up. A stranger approached me and asked, "are you the daughter of Laura Metscher? You look exactly like her." I replied," Yes, I am. "


