Many military families who use independent or community pharmacies will soon have to find an alternative source for their prescription medication needs. Nearly 400,000 beneficiaries, or roughly 4% of the TRICARE-eligible population, will be affected by the change. Note that TRICARE for Life is not impacted by these changes. - Awarding at least three scholarships to JROTC cadets from the Sahuarita, Rio Rico and Nogales High Schools.
- Collecting foods for the junior airmen from the 162nd Fighter Wing, AZ Air National Guard.
- Presenting 30 \$50 gift cards for the local commissary to the airmen just prior to Thanksgiving so that they can purchase a turkey and all the trimmings for a traditional holiday feast.
- Supporting the VA hospital and Women Warriors by donating gently used clothing and new socks and underwear for homeless veterans.
- Donating gift cards, hats, gloves, lap blankets, large print and puzzle books for hospitalized veterans at holiday time.

- Organizing a Toys for Tots collection.

Dues are \$25 per military member, and \$15 for spouses, if you wish to register your spouse in our group of spouse/auxiliary persons. We have revised our membership form to give members an opportunity to see where our Chapter might need help and let them decide what talents they are willing to share with the Chapter. WHAT DO WE DO WITH YOUR DUES?

Some people have asked "Just what does the Chapter do with the $$25\,I$$ send them each year?"





We have to provide an annual report for the Arizona Corporation Commission and have to pay to remain in good standing. We pay for the website and website domain fees. We need stamps for some of our communications to include postage for the newsletter for those who do not have an email account.

When we have external speakers for our events, the Chapter pays for their meals and also provides a MOAA coin to express our appreciation. We absorb some of the cost of the annual Mix & Mingle, rent a post office box, have printing costs, purchase name tags for new members (if you lose your name tag, you have to reimburse the Chapter for a new one).

We have to pay for our liability insurance and pay a stipend to Friends in Deed for the use of a room for our monthly Board meetings.

If our Board members have to travel for MOAA HQ or State meetings, we reimburse them for their travel expenses. We pay our newsletter editor whose efforts have garnered some awards from MOAA HQ.

When members in good standing (meaning that they are current with the dues) pass away, we make a donation to the charity of their choice. Their survivors tell us what it is.

Our webmaster, though not eligible for membership, donates all her time and talents to keep the website up-to-date and has recently developed a Facebook page for us. Visit us at facebook.com/GVMOAA and then "LIKE" our page and our posts on Facebook.

And finally, at holiday time, which is just around the corner, we buy the gifts that Santa distributes at our holiday event.

We definitely do not squander the funds we receive for dues. The money we spend for charitable endeavors does not come from dues but rather from donations and grants—and the 50-50 raffle at each of our events.

CHAPTER HAS ITS FIRST REPRESENTATIVE ON THE SURVIVING SPOUSE ADVISORY COUNCIL

Nora Durham, the Chapter's Surviving Spouse Liaison, was recently appointed to the Surviving Spouse Advisory Council (SSAC) by Lt Gen Dana T Atkins, MOAA's President and CEO. Her appointment

letter said her job will be to "assist the MOAA President in fulfilling oversight responsibilities for MOAA's surviving spouse programs and resources for surviving spouses within councils, chapters, and satellites, and throughout the MOAA leadership."

The spouses on the Council make recommendations to the MOAA leadership on MOAA policies regarding surviving spouse and advocacy issues and surviving spouse membership. Nora will serve a four-year term.

The SSAC was established in 2004 as the Auxiliary Member Advisory Committee to report to and advise the MOAA president about issues that are important to the surviving spouses of MOAA members. Its main goal is to represent not only survivors but also military spouses about issues that impact them.

The SSAC has had numerous major accomplishments, including:

- Creating and designing the *Survivor's*Planning Guide: A Handbook for One of Life's

 Toughest Assignments.
- Starting in 2018, the Surviving Spouse Virtual Chapter. The chapter currently meets via phone on the third Tuesday of each month and has grown from 10 members to 160 members from 33 states.
- Assisting with the 2019 passage of the bill that eliminated the Survivor Benefit Plan-Dependency and Indemnity Compensation offset. This effort took 40 years to accomplish.
- Developing and producing the Surviving Spouse Liaison Training program that is held several times each year in conjunction with the regional chapter leadership training.

Current members of the council represent all services and several states and bring a broad swath of experience. Each member was nominated by her chapter and then thoroughly vetted and selected by members of the SSAC.

Congratulations, Nora. We know you will make a positive impact on the Council.

RETURN OF C-53D AIRCRAFT TO EUROPE (November Program)

COL Tim Tarris, USAF (Ret), was part of a crew that returned a C-53D aircraft to Europe for the 75th Anniversary of D-Day and the 70th Anniversary of the Berlin Airlift. He will relive that historic event at the Chapter dinner on November 15 at Grill on the Green, 5800 S Camino Del Sol. The meal for the event will be a traditional turkey dinner with all the trimmings and pumpkin pie for dessert. Gluten-free and vegetarian meals are available upon request. Cost for the meal will be \$32.

The C-53D *Skytrooper* was nicknamed the D-Day Doll. During WWII, Douglas made over 16,000 of the DC-3 type aircraft, 380 of which were C-53s. During the 75th anniversary of D-Day, there were DC-3s, C-47s, C-53s and a C-49 participating in the

ceremonies. Of these, 17 were from the US and 10 from European countries. They all flew together for the occasion. Some of those that jumped during the anniversary reenactment also jumped on the original D-Day. COL Tarris will be bringing literature and models of the C-53 to the dinner.

Tim will speak about the background of the aircraft and the journey itself and why it was historically important. He will show a video of the aircraft being prepared for the journey in 2018-2019, highlights of the trip including stops in Normandy, Germany and France and the return home.



In 1973, Tim was commissioned as an Air Force 2nd Lieutenant. He attended Undergraduate Pilot Training at Williams AFB, Arizona graduating in 1974 as a Distinguished Graduate. He was assigned to fly the F-111D at Cannon AFB, New Mexico.

In 1981 he joined the Ohio Air National Guard (ANG) in Toledo and later the Arizona ANG in Tucson. While there, he was an instructor for A-7D Corsair II and the F-16A/C Fighting Falcon aircraft. In 2000, as Director of Operations for the State of Arizona, he flew the KC-135 Tanker in Phoenix. He retired as a Colonel with 30 years' service in 2003.

JROTC FALL UPDATE

All three JROTC programs in our area are busy and involved in many activities. Our update this time will start at Nogales High School where 147 cadets are enrolled in the Air Force JROTC unit. Over 100 of those cadets are signed up to participate in Civil Air Patrol (CAP) flights this academic year. So far, 16 cadets have flown. The entire unit is studying Astronomy this year and they received ten



telescopes from CAP to complement their Astronomy class. And most of the cadets will take a field trip to the University of Arizona Flandrau Planetarium soon. Additionally, their Color Guard and Drill Team are preparing to participate in competitions later this year.

The Naval JROTC unit has an enrollment of 161 cadets this year from Sahuarita High School, Walden Grove High School, Sahuarita Middle School, charter and home schools. (Note: There are no home-schooled cadets in the Army or Air Force JROTC programs.) Recently, the Secretary of the Navy designated Sahuarita NJROTC as a 2021-2022 Distinguished Unit with Academic Honors. And this competition season is off to a busy start. They hosted an Area 11 Marksmanship Qualifier competition recently and their Precision Shooting Team is preparing for regional competition next spring. The Armed and Unarmed Drill teams are ready to compete against other Arizona NJROTC teams very soon. Additionally, the Academic Team will compete in a "Brain Brawl" next month at Apollo High School in Glendale, AZ. And the unit's Annual Military Inspection will be held in October. (See article on page 5 for details.)

The Army JROTC unit at Rio Rico High School currently has 136 cadets. Several members recently participated in a marksmanship event that was held at Sahuarita High School. Two of those cadets placed 2nd and 4th in that competition. Many cadets are preparing for the "First Raider" competition that will be held soon at Sahuarita High School. Their next marksmanship match will be at Flowing Wells High School in October. Also, many cadets will participate in an Orienteering Meet on October 15th at Santa Fe Ranch.

The instructors of all the units tell us that the cadets are very glad to be actively involved with JROTC again!



'Tens of Thousands' More Veterans Became Eligible for VA Care Starting Oct. 1

Thousands more veterans will be eligible for Veterans Affairs health care beginning Saturday <u>under a law passed Aug. 10</u> that expanded benefits for former service members sickened by environmental exposures.

According to VA officials, "tens of thousands" of veterans became eligible to enroll in VA health care starting Oct. 1. The largest group to be eligible are post-9/11 veterans who meet certain criteria and hadn't previously enrolled. They will have a one-year window to sign up, according to the law.

VA Secretary Denis McDonough told reporters during a meeting of the Defense Writers Group in Washington, D.C., on Monday that the VA has hired additional staff to handle claims and increased demand for health care for veterans.

"Saturday, we started an open enrollment period at [the Veterans Health Administration] for health benefits. That's an important moment for us," McDonough said.

To be eligible, veterans would need to have served on active duty in a combat theater after the 1991 Persian Gulf War, served against a hostile force after Nov. 11, 1998, or were discharged or released from active duty from Sept. 11, 2001, to Oct. 1, 2013.

Some additional groups of Vietnam veterans and Gulf War vets are also eligible to enroll under certain circumstances.

Vietnam-era veterans will be eligible for care if they served any time in:

- Vietnam from Jan. 9, 1962, to May 7, 1975
- Thailand at a U.S. or Royal Thai base from Jan. 9, 1962, to June 30, 1976
- Laos from Dec. 1, 1965, to Sept. 30, 1969
- Guam or American Samoa -- or their territorial waters -- from Jan. 9, 1962, to July 31, 1980
- Johnston Atoll, or a ship that called there, from Jan. 1, 1972, to Sept. 30, 1977

And any veterans who served after the Persian Gulf war and earned an expeditionary medal, a campaign-specific medal or another combat theater award, or a veteran who engaged in combat against a hostile force on or after Nov. 11, 1998, also became eligible beginning Oct. 1.

"I highly encourage these Veterans to apply now for the health care they've earned and deserve," McDonough said Wednesday in a press release. "This expansion will bring generations of new Veterans into VA health care, and increase the health care benefits of many more, which will result in the one outcome that matters most: better health outcomes for veterans."

The Sgt. First Class Heath Robinson Honoring our Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics, or PACT Act, named for an Ohio National Guard soldier who died of lung cancer in 2020 at age 39, <u>broadened health care services and disability compensation to an estimated 1 million veterans</u> thought to be exposed to chemicals, pollution and other exposures during their military service.

In addition to health care expansion, the law designated 23 illnesses as presumed to be related to exposure to burn pits used in Iraq, Afghanistan and elsewhere as part of the Global War on Terrorism, and it added two conditions -- hypertension and monoclonal gammopathy of undetermined significance -- for Vietnam veterans.

The designation allows veterans with the illnesses to receive disability benefits more expeditiously since they aren't required to prove that their disease is service connected, a process that can be drawn out and that entails extensive documentation and medical assessments.

The <u>Department of Veterans Affairs</u> established a web page to keep former service members informed of their benefits under the <u>PACT Act and is encouraging them to apply</u> for benefits and care by going to the site or calling VA at 1-800-MYVA411, or 1-800-698-2411.

Under the law, veterans can get screened for toxic exposures as well -- meeting with a health provider to determine whether they were exposed or have any health conditions related to the exposure.

The VA began a pilot program for these short screenings, finding that 37.4% of the 13,380 veterans screened at 12 medical centers had exposure concerns.

"These results will help VA make toxic exposure screenings available to all veterans in early November ... and make sure that VA provides all toxic-exposed veterans with the care they need and benefits they deserve," VA officials said in a statement.

According to the VA, the department set an all-time record for disability compensation claims filed online, and more than 70,000 PACT Act-related claims have been filed to date.

The legislation is expected to cost roughly \$277 billion through 2031.

Here's Why Your Medicare Part B Costs May Drop in 2023

Medicare beneficiaries who saw a double-digit-percentage increase in their Part B premiums for 2022 are in line for relief next year, according to a recent statement from the head of the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS).

High expected costs connected to Aduhelm, a new Alzhemer's drug, played a part in a 14.5% jump in premiums from 2021 to 2022 for most Part B users; an HHS statement issued May 27 calls those expectations "an overestimate" and says "the reduction in premium costs attributable to Aduhelm will be incorporated into Medicare premiums for 2023 to lower Part B premiums paid by Medicare beneficiaries."

Discussions of a potential rate cut took place <u>as early as January</u>. At the time, HHS Secretary Xavier Becerra said changes could come later in the year; in the recent statement, he made clear the 2022 rates would remain in place.

"We had hoped to achieve this sooner, but CMS [Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services] explains that the options to accomplish this would not be feasible," Becerra said in the statement, referencing <u>a CMS</u> report on the issue.

Medicare officially announced in April its decision to cover Aduhlem only in cases where the patient participates in an official clinical trial. This will significantly reduce the number of Medicare beneficiaries eligible for the drug, which <u>reportedly had been priced as high as \$56,000 for a year's worth of treatments</u> – a figure that's since been cut in half.

Neither HHS nor CMS provided any indications of an expected Part B premium for 2023, nor did they clarify whether any planned rate reduction would equate to a lower premium or simply a lower-than-expected increase, given recent inflation trends.
